ITEM	GOAL	PROGRESS/ COMMENTS
New members	+75 (net)	We had a net growth of 41 by the end of April 2010. The chances of meeting our goal is slim but we refuse to give up. <b>Our District has the highest growth rate</b>
New clubs	3	One so far. No other potential club is on the horizon. Unfortunately Aberdeen's Charter was cancelled. Everything possible was done to avert this step but the Club just refused to co-operate. The Club had 4 members.
Branch Clubs	1	None as yet. <b>Port Alfred will be born on 4 June.</b> Renewed efforts are focused on Mossel Bay. Adelaide has also expressed interest in starting a Branch under the guidance of Fort Beaufort. These will hopefully materialize next year.
Leo Clubs	2	<b>There are presently four Clubs, ie at PE Host, KWT, Uitenhage and Eden Lions Clubs.</b> The chances are there that PE Host and Eden will Charter their Clubs before the end of June
Retention	20% drop in losses	As on 31 March we had gained 93 members but lost 52. <b>We are positive in having 30% less losses than last year but even that is not good enough.</b>

Admin/ Fin	80% improvement	At the end of April, 4 MMR's were outstanding for no longer than one month, whilst 26 were NOT OUTSTANDING. This is an achievement and demonstrates the dedication of our Clubs. The financial side has also improved. As at the end of March all dues were paid by Clubs, baring small amounts in some cases which is attributed to fluctuations in the exchange rates

Peace Poster	15% (changed to 100%) increase in Clubs participating.	The procedure has been changed in that Clubs could order their kits from the Distr who in turn placed a "bulk" order from LCI. Last year 6 Clubs participated. This year 17 Clubs placed orders whilst at least CLUB ordered directly from International. It seems that at least 18 Clubs will participate which is great and represents an improvement of 200%
Training of incoming officers (including incoming members of Cab)	25% increase in trainees	This training will be conducted from 21 to 23 May. Trainees will be expected to have compiled their plans for the 2010/11 lionistic year, clearly setting out their quantified goals and target dates. Training was discussed in our previous Newsletter."

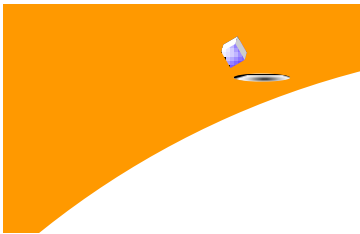

## New Club Suspension Policy

Here below is the new Suspension policy as advised by LCI:

*In April, 2010 the Board of Directors approved an amended policy, effective July 2, 2010 that affects Clubs that have not paid their club balances on time. The policy is as follows:*

*A Club which has an unpaid balance in excess of US\$20 per member or US\$1,000 per club, whichever is less, outstanding past 120 days will be automatically suspended including the charter, rights, privileges, and obligation of the Lions Club. In the event, the Club does not reach an active status by the 28th of the following month the club's charter would be automatically cancelled.*

*Suspension is the temporary deferment of the charter, rights, privileges and obligations of a Lions club due to an unpaid balance.*

*Clubs on suspension shall not:*

- (a) Conduct service activities*
- (b) Conduct fund raising activities;*
- (c) Participate in district and multiple district functions or seminars;*
- (d) Participate in any voting procedures outside of the club*
- (e) Endorse or nominate a candidate for district, multiple district*

*and international office;*

*(f) Submit Monthly Membership Report and report forms;*

*(g) Sponsor a Lions club, or organize a Leo or a Lioness club. Clubs on Suspension shall:*

*(a) Hold meetings to discuss the future of the club and identify the steps needed to regain an active status.*

*(b) Make payments to clear the existing outstanding balance, or request a payment plan.*

*This revised policy has serious consequences for clubs that are in arrears in paying their club balances. This policy could affect Clubs that have as little as two per-capita billings or less unpaid at 120 days. Clubs placed on suspension may regain an active status by sending payments sufficient to pay the balance. A re-activation report will not be required to regain an active status, however, officers should immediately review and update the membership roster after a Club is released from Suspension.*

*Dues are the primary source of income used to support the programs and services provided to our membership.*

*Regular and prompt payment is expected to ensure continued sup-*

*port of this great operation.*

*We hope all clubs will review their statements regularly, and will send the necessary payments to ensure their good status is protected. Membership Billing and Accounts Services*

**The changes are serious and it determines now that the unpaid balances of a club in excess of US\$20 per member, or US\$1000, whichever is less, past 120 days, (previously 150 days), will be automatically suspended. If the club does not reach active status by the 28th of the following month, (previously 90 days) the clubs charter will be automatically cancelled.**

Greetings from LIFE Community Services. I thought it would be good to inform you and your members that we are about to embark on our 3rd season of the

LIFESKILLS programme with the children at LIFE Community Services. We have completed 2 full courses and will now start a 3rd 2-year



course with adolescents in the disadvantaged communities. We have trained another 10 facilitators and 10 groups of approximately 20 children in each group will meet at our Centres,

on a weekly basis from next week onwards.

This programme has had a huge impact on the 10 - 13 year old age group, equipping them with lifeskills that changes their lifestyles and gives them hope and goals to aim towards as they live in extremely difficult circumstances.

Thank you again for introducing us to this excellent programme, and for investing in LIFE and our children.

They have also started their first real Service Project in the

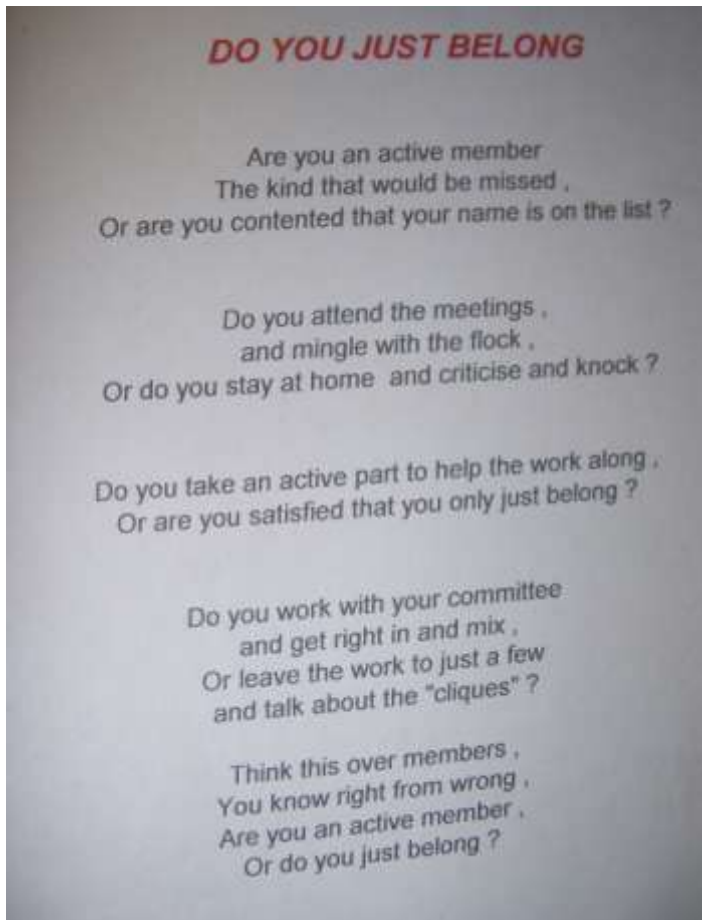
form of a "Winter Bin" to collect old clothing, blankets etc for distribution.

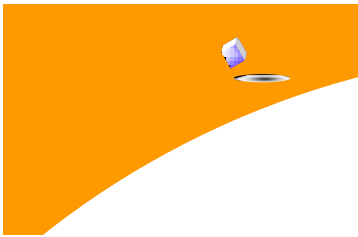
The Leo's, who now number 15, are adamant that they will charter
